## **Area Road Report**

Tuolumne County Department of Public Works has submitted, per our request, a summary of the work maintenance for our subdivision for fiscal year 1999/2000. County



objectives were outlined as follows:

- 1. Improve sight distance and provide vegetation control which includes extensive brushing of Kewin Mill Rd.
- 2. Help reduce sub-grade intrusion of water into paved surface, reduce standing water to reduce icy conditions. Drainage has been re-established with shoulder grading. Improve and buildup/widen shoulders by importing road base to grade. Replace cross culverts and place drainage down drains where needed. Replace large cross culvert pipe and provided structural repairs.
- 3. Tree removal: Ongoing hazard tree removal throughout Cedar Ridge.

- 4. Digging out removal of cracked/failed pavement. Fix standing uplifting water from pushing and cracking pavement. Dig out material and replace with compacted road base
- 5. Replacement of worn out street signs, stop signs, regulatory signs. Provide vandalism repair and graffiti removal on an ongoing basis. Placement of large "Snow Removal" warning signs regarding the parking on road while snow removal operation takes place. This is part of ongoing snow removal operations.
- 6. Regarding striping and pavement marking: County will keep centerline and paint and edge-line paint maintained with reflective paint. This will assist in night driving conditions and provide safer driving conditions. All pavement markings will be repainted as needed i.e. "Stop" legend and limit lines.

Due to budgetary constraints and funding issues, I do not know at this time what future work will be on Kewin Mill Rd.

Funding for road operations maintenance is generated mostly from timber reserve receipts. This means whatever timber is harvested from USFS's land, a portion of these funds goes to roads and schools. With an unsteady revenue source it is very difficult to maintain 680 miles of County roads currently in our maintained road system."

## **Dogwoods to Bloom Soon**



It won't be long until our beautiful dogwood trees are in full bloom. Trees that are in Cedar Ridge are the variety called Pacific or Western dogwood. Unlike the shrubs of the mid-west dogwood, our Pacific dogwood is a tree that can be 50' high with a 20' spread. These treasures are native to Pacific Northwest

and northern California. It is one of our most spectacular natives. Unfortunately, it's not as easy to grow in gardens as Eastern dogwood. It reacts unfavorably to routine garden watering, fertilizing, pruning, and injury to its tender bark provides entrance for insects and diseases. But if you give plants exceptionally good drainage, infrequent summer water and plant under high-branching trees so bark will not sunburn, you have a chance of success.

Right now, the 2-3" white flowers are past budding. This magnificent spring display will be followed in the fall by pinkish leaves, creating color in our fall landscape. Then the robins and other birds will arrive to harvest the bright red seed pods that form before winter sets in. So year 'round, these dogwoods give beauty and color. There are trees blooming in the ravines in the subdivision and a beautiful stand along Kewin Mill near North Oxbow.

### Earth Day - April 22, 2000

Volunteers are being sought for Earth Day 2000 cleanup day in Cedar Ridge Saturday, April 22, 9:00 AM-1:00 PM.

As part of the California State Parks Foundation's Earth Day 200 Restoration and Cleanup presented by Enron, the Stanislaus National Forest, Mi Wok Ranger Dist. is seeking volunteers for garbage and debris cleanup in the areas of Cedar Ridge and Mt. Elizabeth. Volunteers will help in the removal of garbage and debris that has been dumped illegally by placing debris into ON SITE dumpsters in honor of Earth Day's 30th Anniversary. This project is one of 74 environmental stewardship sites funded through the California State Park Foundation's Earth Day program. Last month \$102,032 in grants were awarded for conservation and rehabilitation efforts in 28 California counties.

Over the past three years, the California State Parks Foundation's Earth Day Restoration and Cleanup program has contributed more than \$275,000 for long overdue environmental stewardship projects. Nearly 20,000 volunteers have been mobilized to assist with the massive effort, which is the nation's only statewide Earth Day program. During the 1999 event, volunteers planted 7,500 trees & flowers, removed 3,000 nonnative plants, picked up 4,000 bags of debris, restored 50 miles of trails and launched 21 recycling or composting programs.

Volunteering on Earth Day to clean up litter and garbage is a terrific opportunity for members of our Cedar Ridge community to join together and give back to our local national Forests System Lands. Working together, we are able to accomplish thousands of dollars in

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environmental and community improvements that otherwise would not be completed. With your help, we can make a difference.

We will be meeting at Keltz Mine Road at 9:00 am. Go to the end of Kewin Mill Road to Estralita. Bear to the right and there is a sign to Keltz Mine Rd. There should be plenty of parking.

# - Historic Properties -

I decided to include a property some 4 miles from Cedar Ridge in this historical segment of the CRRPOA Newsletter. Most of us who live here know about Sierra Glen Ranch and some of us have enjoyed picking berries at the Ranch, taking the children on field trips there and have savored

their fresh pies.
Located on Big
Hill Road, this
property has a
spectacular view,
open areas and
commercial
orchards and
Christmas tree
farm.
But the story
starts in

Waltham, Maine. Solomon and Nahum Haslam made their way west. The brothers settled in the Columbia area. Each had 2 sons. One son, William was born in 1831, Solomon in 1832. In 1879, Solomon married a girl of 19.

In March of 1872, Solomon received a Federal Land Grant for a large section of, part of which is the Sierra Glen Ranch today.

But the more interesting part of the tale is the story surrounding Solomon. Seems that he shot & killed Sam

Brooks. He and Brooks had squabbled over a claim for some time. One day, it got out of hand and when Brooks "called him names" Solomon shot in "self defense" and was exonerated for the crime. A local doctor told the Court that Brooks was seriously ill and had only about 6 months to live at the time of the

shooting. Solomon died in April of 1888, leaving the wife, Anna & 3 small children.

Nahum Haslam owned 830 acres from east of Columbia through Yankee Hill, to near the present Belleview school. Part of this land was the Haslam Ranch, now Sierra Glen. Nahum Haslan was killed by a runaway team (not an uncommon tragedy in those days) in November of 1886.

The Sierra Glen parcel was also owned by Charles Segerstrom who bought the land for the timber rights. This harvest was primarily used for the Carson Hill Mine. In 1921 orchards were re-planted by Wilber Robertson for owners Segerstrom & Burden. Bunk houses for workers were built on the property. Wilber Robertson and Vernon Hatler were in school together, Vernon, the youngest of 10 children, becoming a teacher at the early Belleview school. It was "portable" and placed on Big Hill Road, not far from the current mobile home park. Wilber Robertson and Montgomery were trustees of the school.

Currently the ranch is owned by Don & Carol Jones who's father formerly owned the property. Don and Gaye Wolfe have worked as managers in recent years and have brought the orchards up to date with modern methods of pest control and marketing advances. When Sierra Glen opens with the first harvest of berries (usually in mid-June) it is a short drive with a beautiful view of the foothills. Take Big Hill Road about 2+ miles from Belleview school intersection.
